This Spring, Bragg Creek has an opportunity to shape its future. On March 25th, Rockyview Council's approved the Bragg Creek residents' Visioning Committee's proposal (see full text in this newsletter) towards the renewal of the Area Structure Plan (ASP) for our Hamlet and nearby expansion area. The County now wishes to know what you think. **Their engagement session is on April 16** at the Bragg Creek Community Centre, and all Bragg Creek residents are invited to participate.

- Should Bragg Creek embrace a small forest community lifestyle where residents, visitors, and wildlife coexist or should it expand?
- If we expand, what conditions need to be in place to ensure we enjoy what we have right now and, perhaps even improve on it?
- Though the ASP focuses on the hamlet and area near the Banded Peak school, its ripple effects will touch us all. So this isn't just for a few — it includes the greater Bragg Creek area.

To bring in context, over the past year, Bragg Creek Wild has provided insights on the impact of local land use has had over the past 100+ years and includes current trends.

The survey takes 2 minutes and the results will be shared on our social media platforms, website, and with Rockyview County.

Bragg Creek Wild has been collaborating with Rockyview County since 2023 to develop a garbage bylaw aimed at reducing wildlife-human conflicts and in particular bear-related incidents, in both residential and commercial areas.

DID YOU KNOW...

This initiative was prompted by a tragic incident in the fall of 2022 involving a sow (female bear) and her three cubs. The sow became habituated to feeding on garbage stored outside a home, which led to her being euthanized and leaving the cubs to fend for themselves. Since then, there have been numerous reports of bear sightings near homes and the hamlet, along with sightings of other large carnivores, such as cougars.

- Bragg Creek is a "forest community" located in a rich wildlife habitat.

- Rockyview County does not have a garbage bylaw to regulate the storage and disposal of refuse in Bragg Creek.
- Other communities in similar contexts (e.g., Banff, Canmore, and Redwood and some neighbourhoods in Calgary) have garbage bylaws.
- Wildlife-human conflicts pose a significant safety risk for both wildlife and humans.

Bragg Creek Went Wild With Brian Keating

March 14, 2025

An enthralled audience of over 270 listened to Brian's travel stories and encounters with exotic and seemingly mundane wildlife from our backyard. Laughter and profound messages intertwined, supported by stunning photos and video. Many of Brian's inspiring wild encounters were from right here, in our collective "backyard"—a clear indication that we live in a rich wildlife habitat.

Between self-deprecating anecdotes of being at the wrong place at the right time and at the right place at the right time, Brian shared tips on how to encounter wildlife without being intrusive and remaining safe. *"The idea is to go to a place where few other humans are, stay quiet, discrete, still, alert, and see what happens. Take it all in, and soon, little details will come into focus, including wildlife or other aspects of nature such as*

plants, sounds, and light." As he says, you need to be patient, persistent, plan well and have "dumb luck".



Brian Keating lived most of his life in Calgary and worked for the Calgary Zoo, raising funds for conservation projects. He also taught at the University of Calgary's anthropology department, explored over 60 countries on seven continents, delving into ocean depths with unbelievable creatures, visiting deserts and rich tropical forests, and in places where wildlife numbers are overwhelming. Today, he still travels, writes, and gives live presentations—his websites: www.goingwild.org and www.greatbignature.com.





Reflecting on his childhood, Brian noted that if kids spent more time outdoors instead of on screens, their health and appreciation for nature would improve. He urged the community to introduce youth to the outdoors.

Keating shared key messages with Bragg Creekers and nearby communities stating that *“What you have here is of world class quality, but you can lose it in a flash. Please protect it while it still exists. Care for it and do what you must to conserve it.”* Keating also noted the importance of Bear Smart programs and bear-proof bins, warning, *“If you lose your bears, you lose the aura of what this place is about. This is why having a Bear Smart program and installing bear proof bins are so important.”*

Brian concluded by encouraging the audience to watch the recordings of the

previous two presentations Bragg Creek Wild put on in the past year. Keating’s presentation was the third in a series of three which theme was *“wildlife and people living in community”*. Dr. Brad Stelfox's presentation focused on *“Understanding Human Impact on the Land”*, and Guy Greenaway explained how we can protect the land. New Life on the Move

Spring Safety Starts Behind the Wheel

As spring arrives and temperatures rise, wildlife activity increases, especially deer migrating and does giving birth.

Unfortunately, the fawning season (late May–June) is a peak time for wildlife-vehicle collisions in Alberta — with over 90% involving ungulates like deer.

Does with fawns are vulnerable, needing peace and safety. Roads cut through their habitats, increasing risks for both animals and drivers.

TO PREVENT COLLISIONS

- Obey speed limits and stay alert.
- Watch for deer crossing signs.
- Be especially careful at dawn and dusk.
- Slow down if you see a deer — others may follow.
- Don't rely on deer whistles or honk your horn.
- Flash headlights to help deer move if they freeze.

- Never swerve — brake and stop in your lane.

Why it matters: Collisions cause injury, death, property damage, and ecosystem disruption. Let's work together to protect wildlife and preserve the beauty of Bragg Creek. Stay safe and spread awareness.

Please find attached my final report of the Bragg Creek Area Structure Plan Vision Committee (the Committee). In 2024, I was tasked with the role of Chair of the Committee and to document the discussion and outcome, a role that I considered to be a honour and privilege. As an outsider to the community and with no conflicts of interest (I am a full-time faculty member in the planning school at the University of Alberta), I strived to be as objective and complete as possible. The final Vision is my best effort to capture the discussions of the Committee.

Overall, I was impressed with the collaborative spirit of all Committee members and while there was different perspectives and priorities, there were seldom any significant disagreements. All clearly cared for their community and want a sustainable future for the Hamlet and the Hamlet Growth Area. Committee members recognized the need to plan for growth and that growth can be an opportunity. The aspiration for a regenerative community speaks to the need for a holistic approach to balancing development with the complex ecology of the area which is it's greatest asset. Growth pressures from being part of a growing County and region are felt but can be managed with careful planning and working with the community. There is an understandable frustration with a lack of local governance and that will should be addressed through the ASP planning process and beyond.

Bragg Creek is a special place, cherished by its residents and the broader region. There is truly an opportunity for the Hamlet to be a model community of responsible development within a sensitive forest ecosystem. It is my hope that the Vision is the start of a successful ASP process and many thanks to all the Committee members for their time, understanding, and effort.






Key Themes and Observations

As Chair, I observed a number of key themes worthy of mention. First and foremost is a genuine care for the community and its natural environment and an openness to growth and change but that future development must proceed in balance with and respect for the ecological integrity of the area. Other key themes include:

- 1. An inclusive community.** Bragg Creek struggles with affordability, especially for local workers, and needs more diverse housing options that work for people at different stages of life. Beyond housing, there is a need for accessibility throughout the community and the ability for all ages and abilities to move through and access local facilities and amenities.
- 2. A vision for regenerative development.** Regenerative development principles emphasize a holistic approach to managing the relationship between the built and natural environments. As the community develops, projects should be designed to not only limit environmental impacts but create a net-positive impact. This can be achieved through thoughtful site and building design to repair and reconnect ecological assets and creating a circular relationship with the larger environment.
- 3. A sustainable visitor economy.** Bragg Creek has long been a major visitor destination, particularly for day trips to visit local businesses and access the diverse recreational opportunities. There is opportunity to grow the visitor experience and economy but to be sustainable, it must develop in balance with community principles, resident livability, and ecological integrity. Further, there is a desire to develop a more well-rounded visitor economy attracting more economic activity through the week and the seasons.
- 4. A community living within limits.** From the beginning of Committee discussions, there was an emphasis on the awareness of Bragg Creek as part of a larger ecosystem and set of landscapes and habitats, at the headwaters of the Elbow River, and located in the forest. The theme of respecting the ecological and infrastructural limits of the place was recurrent but also recognizing the risks of flood and fire and the liability of developing without regard for the environment was a key concern.
- 5. A governance challenge.** Bragg Creek is a hamlet and a unique place in the larger Rocky View County, Calgary region, and South Saskatchewan river system. There is a frustration with the lack of local decision-making and a strong desire to ensure the ASP process and subsequent development reflects community priorities and qualities.



OVERALL PLAN VISION

Bragg Creek is celebrated for its small town character, strong sense of identity, and regenerative approach to co-existing and enjoying the dynamic forest ecosystem and its wildlife. As it evolves, the community remains steadfast in its commitment to preserving and enhancing the qualities that make it a beloved destination for residents and visitors alike. Guided by a deep respect for its role within the interconnected landscapes of the foothills, forests, watersheds, and wildlife habitats, Bragg Creek embraces growth as an opportunity to invest in sustainable and adaptive strategies and sustain our fundamental values of community, safety, economy, equity, affordable living, aging in place, learning, and recreating in balance with environmental stewardship, economic vitality, and social well-being, ensuring resilience in the face of change.

By championing a holistic and regenerative approach to land use and development, Bragg Creek continues to thrive as a hub of ecological health and regional prosperity, contributing meaningfully to the sustainable future of its natural and human communities and serving as a model for other communities to emulate.

The Greater Bragg Creek Area Structure Plan is a forward-thinking and balanced approach to land use planning, development, and stewardship. It upholds the community's core values: living within ecological limits, fostering a connected and inclusive community, supporting a vibrant and

vibrant and innovative economy, promoting an active outdoor lifestyle, and nurturing a profound connection to nature and its surrounding landscapes. By providing clear and actionable guidance for future growth, the plan ensures that new development respects and enhances the character and identity of Bragg Creek. It seeks to balance the opportunities of growth with the responsibility to protect and sustain the unique natural and cultural assets that define the area, safeguarding the health of its ecosystems, and the well-being of its residents for generations to come.

Key features of the plan shall include:

- **Clear policies and strong guidance** on how to achieve community priorities and realize the community's vision
- **Addressing key challenges**, including housing affordability and availability, as well as infrastructure and water constraints
- **Rooted in a care for place**, recognizing the community's role as stewards of its unique environment
- **Focused on the well-being of residents**, ensuring Bragg Creek is a place where people of all ages can thrive
- **Guided by the land**, emphasizing that land management and development activities shall be guided by, and respect the limitations of, the natural landscape
- **A strong technical basis** for future decision making, supported by comprehensive studies and a Natural Asset Management Plan that captures the complexity of this unique area and provides guidance for regenerative development

- **Recognizing the impact of climate change** and the necessity to mitigate its impact in the planning and development process
- **Recognizing that the subject area is small** is susceptible to natural disturbances and consequently requires thoughtful consideration and planning
- **Recognizing that our community serves a larger area** and population which must be considered and planned for in balance with the limitations of a small community and a sensitive natural environment

LAND USE

Bragg Creek is a community that evolves as it grows, provides meaningful housing choices that allow for different life stages and supports the local economy by enabling workers to live in the community. Future development is designed to fit within the landscape, add linkages and improve ecological function where feasible, and fulfill regional requirements in a manner compatible with community character and quality.

Key Features shall include:

- **Development of a mix of housing types** appropriate for different housing needs at different stages of life, and supporting the local workforce and varied demographic demands including employees, adult children of residents, retirees, and newcomers.
- **Appropriate density increases** scaled to available public amenities and employment opportunities
- **Integrated development** that provides a variety of uses and amenities in a footprint to optimize the use of land
- **Clustering of development** to balance housing needs with ecological functions
- **Acknowledgement of Constraints** recognizing the limitations of the landscape, including its location within a flood zone, restricted road access and potential for negatively impacting the greater Bragg Creek. These constraints limit the area available for supporting new development. A balanced approach to future development must align with the area's infrastructural capacities and environmental considerations
- **Ensuring safety and security for all** residents and visitors which includes providing egress in the event of emergency, crime prevention, and fire safe design and development
- **Design that fits area character** including conformance with design standards and guidance, respectful of the pioneer heritage of the area and the forest setting.
- **A mix of complimentary and appropriate uses** in zoning while maintaining the primary residential character of residential neighbourhoods

ECONOMY

Bragg Creek's economic future relies on a healthy natural environment. A place-based model for the economy recognizes the inextricable link between place, people, and prosperity. The economy of Bragg Creek thrives based on a diverse model of locally owned commercial enterprises that fit the individual character of the local and surrounding area, home based businesses, and tourism and residential services that encapsulate the unique value

proposition of its residents. Bragg Creek will continue to be a place where artistic and recreational-based businesses can thrive along with new opportunities that align with the community's values.

Key features of the plan shall include:

- **Planning for a Sustainable Economy** integrating economic and environmental stewardship at very stage of land use planning to ensure balanced and sustainable growth.
- **Promoting Resilient Economic Activities** that are adaptable to seasonal changes, weather conditions, and fluctuating tourism trends, ensuring long-term stability and success.
- **Prioritizing Local Serving Business** including supporting a wide range of businesses that support local residents including services and trades.
- **Encouraging Eco-Conscious Visitor Engagement** prioritizing visitor activities that align with community values and prioritize environmental protection, fostering sustainable tourism.
- **Developing A Balanced Destination Economy** that remains resilient over time while addressing the needs of both the local population and visitors and that balances out and is resilient to fluctuations over seasons, days of the week, and weather conditions.
- **Supporting Low-Impact Businesses** including home-based and storefront businesses with minimal environmental impact, such as consulting, health care/well-being/holistic care, education, and arts and culture, which cater to both local and surrounding populations.

COMMUNITY AMENITIES AND FACILITIES

Bragg Creek is an accessible and inclusive community that provides facilities supporting health and well-being, public gathering outdoor recreation, and varied social and artistic opportunities. Opportunities are pursued to expand programming and accommodate evolving recreational, artistic, and cultural demands. Private facilities are encouraged but not at the detriment of public facilities. To ensure a variety of activities, take into account volunteer-run facilities as well as opportunities in neighbouring areas.

Key features of the plan shall include:

- **Meeting diverse and evolving needs** adapting sports and recreation facilities to meet the diverse and evolving needs of the community,
- **Maximizing use of existing facilities** including establishing joint-use agreements with neighbouring facilities to make the most of available resources
- **Promoting active community life** with a focus on improving public spaces to promote an active and engaged community life.
- **Maintaining emergency response plans** including planning for the use of public spaces in the event of disasters (e.g. floods, fires or storms) and during recovery efforts.
- **Ensuring safe access to the river** for both people and wildlife, while maintaining the berm's protective function.
- **Designing Regenerative park and public spaces** that cater to human needs, while also enhancing and preserving habitat functions.
- **Maintaining public and natural spaces** to manage the impact of visitor activity including waste management.



MOBILITY

Bragg Creek is an interconnected and walkable community with mobility links for all ages and abilities. All modes of transportation are accommodated with an emphasis on safety for all and care to limit traffic impacts, including noise, on neighbourhood areas. Improvements are designed to with resilience and coordinated to be economically efficient and reduce impacts. Human mobility is balanced with maintaining and improving ecological corridors and connections and through considering the environmental impact of planned improvements. Natural assets are recognized and incorporated into the planning process.

Key features of the plan shall:

- **Minimizing traffic impact and road congestion** in residential areas including enforcing strict controls on traffic speed and noise.
- **Promoting walkability** and active modes of transportation, such as cycling, running, roller skiing, and other non-motorized options.
- **Prioritizing barrier free access** for individuals with mobility challenges.
- **Balancing mobility and ecology**, ensuring improvements to the transportation system do not result in a loss of ecological function
- **Prioritizing safe mobility throughout the community** including sufficient sidewalks with proper drainage and maintenance over time.
- **Recognizing the value of well-designed and nature-based connections** that support the local visitor economy and encourage outdoor recreation. The aspiration for a regenerative community speaks to the need for a
- holistic approach to balancing development with the complex ecology of the area
- which is it's greatest asset.
